President's Message



Integrity

Integrity, even though a common quality of lawyers, is difficult to define. Trying to explain integrity reminds me of Justice Potter Stewart's statement that "I know it when I see it." Maybe the difficulty is due to integrity being a combination of several qualities - adherence to moral and ethical principles, soundness of moral character, and honesty. But these words ring hollow; maybe it is by model that we learn the meaning of integrity.

Atticus Finch is commonly accepted as the quintessential model of a lawyer with integrity. We have all imagined ourselves as Atticus at one or more times in our careers: wise, empathetic and morally strong. But the setting of a small town during the Depression and the clear moral decision Atticus faced bears little resemblance to our hectic professional lives where choices do not seem clear. Especially when we consider that Atticus Finch was named after a Roman philosopher (Titus Pomponious Atticus) who never took sides in an argument, this model does not satisfactorily define integrity for an advocate.

Examining the life of Socrates, on the other hand, is enlightening. Socrates was known as the wisest person in ancient Greece. He was equally well-known for his integrity; he often prodded the citizens of Athens to consider and do what was right. This prodding probably led to his demise as his comments insulted leading citizens who demanded he be tried on criminal charges. He was convicted - wrongfully say historians -

and sentenced to death. And although his followers bribed the prison guards so he could escape, he declined the offer of freedom. He had, by his reasoning, enjoyed the benefits of Athenian law his entire life and would have, by escaping, refused to follow the law when it did not suit him. Escaping would have contradicted the very principles he stood for.

That is the compelling lesson of Socrates. Integrity is defined not by words, but by our actions. Nowhere is integrity more apparent than when following one's moral principles brings personal pain – hard decisions we all make during our careers. Just like Socrates, it is our actions when faced with tough calls that define whether we have integrity. And just like Justice Stewart, we all know it when we see it.

Phil O'Connell, Jr. and Joe Reiter were proposed for membership. No other business worth mentioning was transacted.



Personal Injury Corner



Medicare and Medicaid Liens

Anyone who has attempted to deal with the State or Federal government on Medicaid or Medicare liens knows the frustration of attempting to settle that kind of lien. That frustration is heightened when the case is one of uncertain liability or limited coverage. Oftentimes the lien exceeds the value of the settlement.

Until recently, there was very little that could be done about these liens. The recent squib opinion in Ross v. Agency for Health Care Admin., 31 Fla. L. Weekly D2159 (Fla. 3rd DCA, August 16, 2006) epitomizes the frustration of arguing about a valid Medicaid lien. In that case, the trial court's order granting the State of Florida 100% on its lien was sustained by the District Court citing Strafford v. Agency for Health Care Admin., 915 So. 2d 643 (Fla. 2nd DCA 2005) and Englich v. Agency for Health Care Admin., 916 So. 2d 994 (Fla. 4th DCA 2005). Fla. Stat. 409.910(11)(f)(1) provides that Medicaid gets full reimbursement unless such reimbursement would take away more than half of a third party benefit.

The landscape on Medicaid and Medicare liens has completely changed with the unanimous decision of the United States Supreme Court in Arkansas Dept. of Health and Human Services v. Ahlborn, 126 S. Ct. 1752 (2006). In that case, the Supreme Court rejected the contention of Arkansas, joined by 30 other States and the United States government, that Arkansas was entitled to the full amount of its lien of \$215,000.00 for a \$550,000.00 settlement. The Supreme Court limited Arkansas to the portion of the settlement that dealt exclusively with past medical costs of approximately \$35,000.00. The Court held that Medicaid, which had paid only medical expenses, could not recover from any portion of the settlement which did not deal with medical expenses and was, therefore, not entitled to reimbursement out of any portion of the settlement which dealt with recovery for lost wages or pain and suffering. At Page 1755, the Supreme Court held:

"Arkansas' statute finds no support in the federal third-party liability provisions. That ADHS cannot claim more than the portion of Ahlborn's settlement that represents medical expenses is suggested by §

1396k(a)(1)(A), which requires that Medicaid recipients, as a condition of eligibility, 'assign the State any rights ... to payment for medical care from any third party' (emphasis added), not their rights to payment for, e.g., lost wages.' (Emphasis in original.)

In Ahlborn, the State admitted that the plaintiff was receiving only about 1/6 of her overall damages and that only approximately \$35,000.00 of that sum was compensation for past medical expenses. Under these circumstances, the Court held that a State's statute which attempted to recover its lien from portions of the settlement unrelated to medical expenses would run afoul of the Federal anti-lien law provision.

The Court also rejected the contention of Arkansas and the United States that failure to provide for 100% reimbursement would allow parties to manipulate the settlement of cases to preclude recovery by the state. At Page 1756, the Court held:

"The risk that parties to a tort suit will allocate away the State's interest can be avoided either by obtaining the State's advance agreement to an allocation or, if necessary, to submitting the matter to a court for decision."

In this age of fractured United States Supreme Court's decisions, often on apparent political grounds, a unanimous decision severely limiting Medicaid liens is a strong argument that the Ahlborn case applies with equal weight to Medicare liens under the Medical Care Recovery Act (MCRA) and the Medicare Secondary Payer Act (MSPA). The portion of the opinion inviting parties to obtain the State or Federal government's agreement to allocation is an important message to anyone handling a case where a governmental lien exists. Notice to the Federal or State government of an intention to bring an action for tort recovery or to settle such an action makes a great deal of sense. Inviting the government to take part in either the action or the settlement or, alternatively, agree upon an allocation also avoids serious future problems. As a last resort, a motion to allocate with notice to the government citing Ahlborn is a second line of defense. This case is one of the most important decisions on governmental lien law ever to be decided by the United States Supreme Court. It is an important decision that everyone practicing personal injury law ought to carefully read.

Dragon NaturallySpeaking Version 9: Same Product, Same Great Results

You may recall that for some time now I have been using speech recognition products by Dragon NaturallySpeaking. The last version I installed, Version 8, has worked marvelously over the past few years. Within two weeks of installing the program, I found that my speech recognition accuracy rate was nearly 97%. Although I don't use it every day, speech recognition has become a valuable tool in my appellate practice. I rely on it whenever I am short on time and long on words.

Only a fellow geek will understand my excitement when I heard that Dragon had come out with a new version, Version 9. I immediately went to their website, http://www.nuance.com/dragon/, to find out what new features were unavailable in the new product. One of the aspects of speech recognition that I have never liked is being connected to the computer with a wired microphone. I was extremely happy to see that Version 9 finally incorporated wireless microphones. At last, I could use a Bluetooth wireless microphone for my dictation. It was a simple decision to purchase Version 9.

(http://www.cdw.com/shop/products/default.aspx?EDC=10184 44, \$90.00 for Dragon NaturallySpeaking Preferred).

Unfortunately, not all wireless microphones are the same. The manufacturers of Dragon NaturallySpeaking have a list of wireless microphones which have been tested and are certified to be compatible with the software. To see the list, go to http://support.nuance.com/compatibility/default.asp. There you will find a list of 5 Bluetooth microphones and 3 radio frequency wireless microphones which have been approved by Nuance for use with Dragon Naturally Speaking. Speech recognition still requires the use of a "boom" microphone, meaning that the very small earpiece microphones which are suitable for use with the cell phone are still unsuitable for use with speech recognition. Speech recognition requires a very high level of audio quality, and will simply not work with the shorter microphones. All the microphones listed on the Nuance website are rated as having approximately the same quality, except the Shure radio frequency microphone. The Shure Performance Gear was rated as being better than the others. Unfortunately, it is also much more expensive.

I opted for the Blueparrot Bluetooth microphone, mostly because it looks cooler than the others (http://www.blueparrott.com/, approximately \$175.00). Let's face it, if you are going to sit in your office with a microphone headset on and look like an air traffic controller,

it should at least be a cool looking wireless microphone. Installation of the Bluetooth microphone was easy, although I had some difficulties getting the computer to recognize the new device. I eventually had to read and follow the instructions that came with the microphone in order to make it work properly. After I did that, it was clear sailing all the way.

Now for the bad news. Whenever you change microphones with Dragon NaturallySpeaking, you have to retrain the software to understand your voice. Your voice sounds different on every microphone, so the speech files that were created, and which you have refined through years of use of Version 8, will have to be thrown away. It took me approximately three days to get the new software to understand my speech again. The good news was that Version 9 appears to be more accurate than Version 8. I estimate that the accuracy rate is higher than 97%, although I have not yet run the tests that I ran when I first received Version 8. Dragon made 7 mistakes when I dictated this article.

I find speech recognition dictation to be an uncomfortable process. I don't like the thought of people listening to me talk to my computer, and I have yet to balance the desire to speak clearly with the desire to speak intelligently. Invariably, I move my head when I look for documents on my desk or in the file. Doing so is a problem when the microphone is attached to the computer. But with the wireless microphone, dictation has become more comfortable. I no longer have the microphone headset pulled off of my head when I lean back in my chair or look for documents on my desk. The freedom of moving around as I speak also helps me forget that I am wearing a headset.

Be sure to shop around for both the software and the microphone, as the prices tend to be radically different. The one place not to purchase the software is the Nuance website. They must have some agreement in their marketing contracts that they will only sell their software on their product at the highest possible price. The same is true of the microphones. I was able to find wireless microphones at radically different prices depending on where I shopped. I never found the best price from the manufacturer.

If you are one of the many attorneys who has adopted voice-recognition, then I encourage you to upgrade to the latest version of Dragon NaturallySpeaking. If you would like to talk to me about any of the other upgrades in Version 9, please contact me. bdr@flappellatelaw.com.

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Bankruptcy

The New Bankruptcy Court Location is Almost Here

Barring any unforseen circumstances, the long anticipated start date for the new home of the West Palm Beach division of the United States Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of Florida is set for December 4, 2006. The bankruptcy court's new home will be on the 8th floor of the Flagler Waterview building, located at 1515 North Flagler Drive. The West Palm Beach division of the bankruptcy court has been without a permanent home since it was forced out of its 701 Clematis Street location, primarily as a result of damage inflicted by Hurricane Francis, in 2004. Since February, 2005, bankruptcy court in West Palm Beach has taken place at its temporary location in the Forum Building on 1675 Palm Beach Lakes Boulevard.

In addition to having more amenities available for attorneys and the Judges, the new bankruptcy court location has direct Atlantic Ocean and Intracoastal Waterway views. Unlike the current temporary location, the new location will

include two complete courtrooms and chambers. Accordingly, Judges Friedman and Hyman will no longer have to share a courtroom and will conduct court at the same time. However, Judges Friedman and Hyman will generally conduct their major motion calendars on different days of the week. The Judges anticipate making their chambers available for settlement conferences. Normal security procedures will apply to enter the courtroom and chambers areas of the 8th floor.

In addition to the extra court room, the new location will include four attorney conference rooms. Although the attorney conference rooms will not initially have WiFi or land line internet access, these options are under study and may be something to look forward to in the future. Administrative Order 2006-16 entered by Chief United States District Judge, William J. Zloch, regarding cellular phone and electronic equipment usage in the courthouse remains applicable. An added perk to the Flagler

Waterview building is the availability of free Valet parking.

Also located on the 8th floor of the Flagler Waterview building will be a United States Trustee's Office and a room to conduct '341 creditor meetings. No separate security entrance will be required to enter the United States Trustee's Office or the '341 meeting room. The bankruptcy court and United States Trustee's office will not be the only governmental tenants at the Flagler Waterview building as the 9th floor of the building is occupied by the Office of the Attorney General of Florida. The other tenants in the building are generally medical offices.

With a little bit of help from mother nature, i.e., no hurricanes, we can all look forward to practicing at the new location in the very near future.



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

Professionalism

A Lawyer's Obligation of Truthfulness When Representing a Client in Negotiations

Today, Florida litigants, like litigants in state courts nationwide, settle nearly fifty-seven percent (57%) of civil cases out of court. The work of lawyers, and, increasingly so today, the use of mediation, are big parts of the settlement dynamics. Perhaps for these reasons, the American Bar Association recently issued Formal Opinion 06-439 (the "Opinion"), to address the increasing concern over the ethical implications of a lawyer's role in settlement negotiations, and, in particular, in caucused mediation.

In a nutshell, the Opinion makes clear that in all settlement negotiations, regardless of whether such negotiations occur in a caucused mediation or otherwise, "a lawyer representing a party may not make a false statement of material fact to a third person. However, statements regarding a party's negotiating goals or its willingness to compromise, as well as statements that can fairly be characterized as negotiation 'puffing,' are ordinarily not considered 'false statements of material fact' within the meaning of the Model Rules."

In reaching this conclusion, the Opinion relied on Rule 4.1(a) of the Model Rules of Professional Conduct, which prohibits a lawyer, "[i]n the course of representing a client," from knowingly making "a false statement of material fact or law to a third person." As to what constitutes a "statement of fact," the Opinion looked to Comment [2] to Rule 4.1 for additional explanation:

This Rule refers to **statements of fact.** Whether a particular statement should be regarded as one of fact can depend on the circumstances. **Under generally accepted conventions in negotiation, certain types of statements ordinarily are not taken as statements of material fact.** Estimates of price or value placed on the subject of a transaction and a party's intentions as to an acceptable settlement of a claim are ordinarily in this category, and so is the existence of an undisclosed principal except where nondisclosure of the principal would constitute fraud. Lawyers should be mindful of their obligations under applicable law to avoid criminal and tortious misrepresentation.

Comment [2] to Rule 4.1, Model Rules of Professional Conduct (emphasis added). Because both the Opinion's conclusion and the Comment's explanation requires a case-by-case consideration of each statement to determine if it is a "statement of fact," the Opinion provides a non-exhaustive list of examples of statements of fact versus examples of "posturing" or "puffing."

Statements which are not considered "statements of fact," and thus situations where a lawyer need not be entirely forthcoming include:

 an attorney understating her client's willingness to make concessions to resolve the dispute;

- an attorney's exaggeration or minimization of the strengths or weaknesses of her factual or legal position; and
- a prosecutor's ultimate willingness to grant immunity as part of a cooperation agreement in order to retain influence over the witness.

The Opinion notes that such remarks are statements upon which parties to a negotiation ordinarily would not be expected justifiably to rely.

By contrast, a party would be expected justifiably to rely on statements of fact, for which a lawyer must always be truthful. Examples of prohibited false statements of material fact include:

- an attorney to declare that documentary evidence will be submitted at trial in support of a claim or defense when the lawyer knows that such documents do not exist or will be inadmissible;
- an attorney in labor negotiations stating to union lawyers that adding a particular employee benefit will cost the company an additional \$100 per employee, when the lawyer knows that it actually will cost only \$20 per employee; and
- a prosecutor or a criminal defense lawyer telling the other party during a plea negotiation that they are aware of an eyewitness to the alleged crime when that is not the case.

So, what does this mean for you? There is a fine line between puffing and lying. Be careful that your comments in mediation regarding your client's position, which otherwise would not be considered statement "of fact," are not conveyed in language that converts them, even inadvertently, into false factual misrepresentations.


Rainmaking 101 by Mark Powers

With the exception of legal skills and managing your time well, the most important skill in assuring your success is the ability to attract good paying clients. Without good (translate: profitable) clients coming through the door on a regular basis, your law practice cannot survive.

Over the next few months, I will introduce you to a step by-step process for increasing your client base. The techniques discussed are practical and have been time tested in the real world. When you see a tip that you like – try it on! I also recommend the suggested exercises at the end of each lesson and, if you work them throughout the series, you will see the real benefits. Most of the suggested exercises are brief. In order to complete them, block out time on your calendar – then honor that appointment with yourself.

Rainmaking Lesson One

If you review the key elements involved in word-of-mouth marketing, it will come as no surprise that most of the elements involve communication and building relationships. And quite honestly, these are areas where most attorneys excel. "Word-of-mouth marketing" means just that – get the word out about you and your practice to others. Successful marketing often comes down to knowing *Who To Talk To, What To Say, and How and When To Say It.* Many attorneys fail to market themselves because they miss one of these steps.



To start, focus first on the *Who To Talk*To. Think about your practice for a minute

- who do you need to talk to in order to
generate more business? Your clients? Your
friends? Your business associates? Not
knowing the answer to this question has
stopped many good attorneys from making

their first marketing effort, yet it is not a difficult question to answer.

It all begins with a profile of your clients. Until you truly know the clientele you serve, you won't know who influences them to do business with you. If, for example, you are an estate-planning attorney, you may prefer to work with high net worth individuals who own their own businesses. These individuals typically have a strong relationship with their CPA, their financial advisor and their investment broker. If you happen to have a good relationship with one of these professionals, they would be in a position to recommend your services. They would be a referral source, or an influencer, because of their ability to influence clients to use your services.

Who Is Your Ideal Client?

If you understand the profile, otherwise known as the demographics, of your ideal clients, you can work backward, as just demonstrated, to determine who influences them.

It is important to note that you will have a different primary client or "target market" for each of your practice areas. In addition, some attorneys, real estate attorneys for example, may have institutional clients that send them work – such as banks. If this is the case, consider the characteristics of the target institutions, as well as the characteristics of the decision-maker inside the institution.

But let's take this one step further. When you start examining the characteristics of your clientele, you will begin to notice that not all clients are equally desirable. Some pay their bills promptly while some don't pay at all. Some clients respect your advice and even recommend you to others, while others are uncooperative and require an extraordinary level of maintenance.

Think about it. Don't you have both good clients and "problem clients"?
This occurs in all practice areas and the inability to distinguish between the two carries with it a high, hidden cost, but more about that later. As an important part of your personal marketing program, you must sharpen your ability to identify the "good" clients. To help you do that, complete the actions outlined in "The First Step" below.

Don't be deceived by how simple this exercise looks – the profiles of the individuals and institutions that you serve are the foundation of your word of-mouth campaign.

"Word-of-mouth marketing will produce the highest quality client."

The First Step

- 1. Make a list of all your current clients. Rank them with an "A," "B," "C" or "D" rating.
- 2. Use the list of attributes provided to help you identify the client characteristics for each of your practice areas.

In doing this exercise, many of Atticus' clients are surprised to discover that most of the information about their client demographics is easily retrieved from their memory. But, if you want more precision, go through your files to look at the information you have collected on your clients through the last 90 days.



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
