My Newest Computer Is the One I Drive

I don't know about you, but I love living in the 21st century. I love almost everything about it. I love the fact that I can watch 225 channels of television beamed to my plasma TV from outer space. I love the fact that I can sit with my computer almost anywhere in the country and connect to the Internet. And I love the fact that I can talk to my computer instead of typing. As you may recall from previous articles, however, I have been less than satisfied with the 21st-century options available in cars.

Well now that has changed too. I proudly drive a brandnew vehicle which is basically a computer with four wheels, an engine, and air conditioning. I'm talking about my 2005 Acura TL. From my research of various car models which have come out in the past two years, it appears that car manufacturers have finally begun to introduce useful technology into new models. The latest crop from the BMW, Mercedes Benz, Audi and Acura now include XM or Sirius radio, navigation systems, some voice-recognition, all-wheel-drive, Bluetooth technology, and sophisticated sound systems which rival anything you have at home. Actually, with regard to the sound systems, the technology might be better since the manufacturer knows exactly where you will be sitting in the car and it is an enclosed space.

After test driving new cars from each of the manufacturers listed above, I finally settled on the Acura because they included more options and executed on them better than the other manufacturers. Acura also did it at a lower price. My favorite new feature is the navigation system. Navigation systems have been available for the last couple years, but they have been so hampered by inadequate technology. Frankly, lawyers have played a part in making technology less useful. Many manufacturers design the navigation system so it cannot be changed or used, other than to follow directions, while the car is moving. Apparently, some lawyer decided that the manufacturer will get sued if the navigation system allows the driver to input an address while the car is moving and the driver has an accident because he is not paying attention to the road. Acura is perhaps taking a risk by allowing the system to be used while the car is moving, but maybe they figured out that the passenger in the car could push the buttons while the car is moving without distracting the driver.

In addition to allowing me to input an address, the navigation system has business information which allows me to look up places without having the address. For example, I was easily able to look up, by name, most law firms that have existed for more than three years. I've also been able to plot a course to most every courthouse in the state by knowing nothing more than the name of the county. Once you pull up the name of the business, the telephone number also appears and that is where the Bluetooth telephone comes into play.

Bluetooth is a wireless communication protocol which connects devices up to 30 feet away. It is commonly used in cellular phones and, to a lesser extent, office equipment. Once I get a Bluetooth cell phone, I will be able to tell the navigation system to dial the phone number and the car's computer will dial the number on my cell phone, connect the phone to the microphone and speaker system in the car and turn off the stereo system volume so that I can carry on my conversation. Actually getting a Bluetooth cell phone has been somewhat of a challenge, however, since I am a Nextel customer and Nextel has apparently decided that the 20th century was a great time for technology and there is no need to advance. If I receive a call while driving, the display panel will show the name of the person calling and ask me if I want to answer.

The voice recognition technology has some other advantages as well. Instead of surfing through 200 channels of music on my XM Satellite Radio, I can simply push a button and say "XM channel 121" to listen to Fox News. I can also use voice commands to control the six disc CD/DVD Audio player, eliminating the need to push buttons to find various CDs. For those of you who are interested, I did not put the same six CDs in this car that were in the old car. I actually bought new discs. That was primarily because the Acura TL has a DVD audio, which provides much greater sound fidelity. Of course, finding DVD Audio discs is a bit of a challenge in itself.

A really great feature available on the navigation system in a different model, the Acura RL, is a constant satellite traffic feed. If the navigation system gets a report of traffic problems along a route that you are following, it will alert you to the traffic problem and reroute you around the jam. I wish that the system would also overlay Doppler Radar weather information on the map as well. It would be helpful to see what weather problems there are along the path that I am traveling. That would require an uplink to the national radar system, and probably cost more, but I think it would be worth it.

Although the TL did not have all-wheel-drive, many cars manufactured these days do. That is another feature which is operated by a computer. The onboard computer constantly monitors road conditions, speed and control of the vehicle and adjusts the power distribution, even putting on the brakes, if the computer senses that you are about to lose control of the vehicle.

New technology has made new car models safer and more fun to drive. If you are looking for an excuse to replace your car, I can think of a dozen. Call or e-mail me, and we'll talk about them. bdr@flappellatelaw.com



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
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YLS Golf Tournament a Success

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

Set Off Of HMO Discounted Bills

In <u>Goble v. Frohman</u>, 30 Fla. L. Weekly S280 (Fla. April 28, 2005), the Supreme Court was faced with a certified question as to whether it was appropriate to set off under Fla. Stat. 768.76 the portion of the medical bills awarded by the jury which are written off by the medical providers pursuant to their contract with the plaintiff's HMO. That case involved a trial which arose from a motorcycle/vehicle accident in which the plaintiff was severely injured. As a result of the accident, the plaintiff incurred almost \$600,000.00 in medical bills but those bills were paid by plaintiff's HMO after the HMO received a substantial discount from the medical providers. As a result, the HMO paid only \$145,000.00 of those bills and the providers, pursuant to their contract with the HMO, agreed to accept that sum in full payment of their bills.

The jury trial resulted in a verdict which included the full amount of the medical bills and the defendant sought a setoff for the portion of the bills which were reduced pursuant to the discount obtained by the HMO. The HMO had a right of subrogation, but only for the amount actually paid. The trial court granted the motion to reduce the amount of the verdict by the discounted amount and the Second District affirmed.

The definition of collateral sources in Fla. Stat. 768.76 is "collateral sources' means any payments made to the claimant or made on the claimant's behalf, by or pursuant to: (3) any contract agreement of any group, organization, partnership or corporation to provide, pay for, or reimburse the costs of hospital, medical, dental, or other healthcare services." Plaintiff argued that the discount was not a "payment" within the meaning of the statute. The Supreme Court rejected that argument in holding that the defendant was entitled to the setoff.

We conclude, as the Second District did, that the contractual discounts fit within the statutory definition of collateral sources. Section 768.76 defines collateral sources as 'payments made' on a claimant's behalf. Virtually all dictionaries include, among the first three definitions of "payment" or "pay," the concept of discharge of a debt. See, e.g. *Merriam-Webster's Collegiate Dictionary* 851 (10th ed. 1993) ('to discharge a debt or obligation"); *Webster's Third New Int'l Dictionary* 1659 (1981) ('discharge of a debt or obligation'). In this case, the discounts negotiated by Goble's HMO fully discharged Gobel's obligation to his medical providers. Because of the medical provider's contracts with Goble's HMO, Goble was obligated to pay the claimants \$145,970.76, rather than the billed charges of \$574,554.31. In this light, the discounts negotiated by Goble's HMO are as much a benefit to Goble as the HMO's remittance of \$145,970.76 to satisfy the remaining charges on Goble's medical bills. The contractual discounts, therefore, constitute 'amounts which have been paid for the benefit of the claimant, or which are otherwise available to the claimant, from [a] collateral source[],: Therefore, under section 768.76, the amount of the contractual discount, for which no right of reimbursement or subrogation exists, is an amount that should be set off against an award of compensatory damages.

Thus, the Supreme Court has held that contractual discounts negotiated by an HMO do come within the statutory definition of collateral sources and the defendant is entitled to a set off for any amounts resulting from that discount.

Doreen Varela Named Pro Bono Attorney of the Month

The Fifteenth Circuit Pro Bono Committee is pleased to announce this month's Pro Bono Attorney of the Month is **DOREEN VARELA**. Doreen, a solo practitioner in West Palm Beach who practices predominantly in the area of marital and family law, donated over 100 hours of her time representing a disabled father in a modification case. Doreen became involved in the litigious case at the request of the Legal Aid Society several years after the parties divorce was final. The case revolved around issues regarding frustration of visitation. The parties had been in court on contempt issues numerous times. The mother of the parties child had only allowed the father to visit the child once in five years. In addition to thwarting the father=s visitation the mother continually made false accusations against the father. Doreen attended many hearings in an effort to resolve the issues in the case. After a year, the case was finally concluded. In addition to her efforts in this particular case, Doreen has been a member of the Pro Bono panel for ten years and assisted clients in a variety of cases. For her tireless efforts on behalf of the underprivileged of Palm Beach County, Doreen Varela is recognized as this month=s Pro Bono Attorney of the Month.

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Legal Aid Receives \$450,000 Grant from Quantum Foundation

The Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County, Inc. is the lead agency in a collaborative entitled the Bioethics Collaboration for Education, Advocacy and Outreach which has recently been awarded a two year grant of \$450,000 from the Quantum Foundation. The supervisor of the Collaboration is Legal Aid attorney, Marnie Poncy who is also a registered nurse. The focus of the project is to assist individuals of all ages to make decisions about their health care in case of incapacity. This includes writing living wills, health care surrogates, signing do-not-resuscitate orders, etc.

Closing agents need to be cautious of the new "broker's lien" legislation which takes effect October 1, 2005. House bill 1459 added two entirely new sections to Chapter 475 of the Florida Statutes – sections 475.700 *et seq* ("Commercial Real Estate Sales Commission Lien Act") and 475.800 et seq ("Commercial Real Estate Leasing Commission Lien Act"). Both real estate and litigation attorneys should familiarize themselves with the new Acts and be aware that different rules apply depending on whether the real estate transaction is a sale or a lease.

Real estate attorneys need to properly advise their clients of the ramifications of the new Acts and/or take steps to protect themselves from liability as a closing agent. Litigation attorneys should take note that the uncertainty and "growing pains" that accompany most new legislation will undoubtedly result in future litigation involving a client's rights, duties and obligations under the Acts. We will likely see an increase in the number of interpleader actions filed by closing agents as well. Please note that there are provisions for prevailing party attorney's fees in sections 475.713 and 475.809. The remainder of this article will provide a brief overview of the new legislation.

As the titles indicate, the new Acts pertain only to *commercial* real estate, as defined in section 475.701(5) and section 475.801(4). The broker's lien does not attach to the actual property in a sale ($\$475.700 \ et \ seq$), but to the seller's net proceeds from the sale. However, the broker's lien does attach to the actual property in a lease ($\$475.800 \ et \ seq$). Also note that only the seller's broker can obtain a broker's lien. The Acts do not provide a lien option for a buyer's broker.

Strict adherence to the disclosure and notice requirements and deadlines as set forth in each section is necessary to create a valid broker's lien. Just a few of the requirements/deadlines pursuant to section 475.700 *et seq* include:

- The broker must disclose its ability to obtain a broker's lien, a right which is not waivable before the commission is earned, to the owner of the property at or before the time the owner executes the brokerage agreement. The Act provides sufficient language for the disclosure.
- The broker must deliver the commission notice to the owner and closing agent, if the closing agent is known, within 30 days of earning the commission. Section 475.703(2) defines when a commission is earned for purposes of this part. The Act provides sufficient language for the notice.
- For a commission notice to be effective, it must be delivered to the closing agent at least 1 day prior to closing.
- A closing agent is deemed to have constructive notice of a commission notice if the notice is recorded for a minimum of 60 days.
- The owner must dispute the broker's lien due within 5 days of closing to ensure the proceeds are not released to the broker.
- If the closing agent has received a commission notice, but the owner has not disputed the commission, the agent should retain the net proceeds from the sale for a minimum

of 5 days in order to ensure proper compliance with section 475.700 *et seq* and help avoid liability.

Just a few of the requirements/deadlines for section 475.800 et seq include:

- The broker must disclose its ability to obtain a broker's lien, a right which is not waivable before the commission is earned, to the owner of the property at or before the time the owner executes the brokerage agreement.
- For a lien notice to be effective, the broker must record the lien notice after the commission is earned and no later than the earlier of 90 days after the tenant takes possession of the leased premises, or the date on which the owner records a deed or assignment transferring the owner's interest in the property to a bona fide purchaser for value, and the broker shall deliver a copy of the lien notice to the owner within 7 days after recording. Section 475.803(2-3) defines when a commission is earned for purposes of this part.
- If the owner records a notice of contest of the broker's lien, the broker must commence a foreclosure action within 60 days of service of the notice of contest or the lien extinguishes automatically.

Section 475.700 *et seq* exposes closing agents to potential liability. The closing agent must carefully monitor whether a broker's lien has been recorded or delivered, whether the owner objects or consents to the lien and whether the parties have complied with the deadlines. The closing agent must carefully calculate the net proceeds in order to exclude mortgages, liens or encumbrances with priority over the broker's lien and reserve disputed commission amounts pending resolution or interpleader of the commission dispute.

Section 475.709(11) *appears* at first reading to absolve closing agents from liability under the Act by including the following language: "[a] closing agent is not liable...in any civil action for any action taken by the closing agent to comply with the provisions of this part." A closer reading of the language, however, reveals that the closing agent is released from liability only if he or she properly *complies* with the Act. A closing agent will still be liable for failing to properly comply with the Act. Section 475.700 et seq effectively causes closing agents to become litigators by forcing them to file an interpleader action and deposit the net proceeds with the court registry in order to be discharged from further liability or responsibility concerning the disputed reserved proceeds.

As this very brief summary of a 44 page bill indicates, the new broker's lien statutes need to be taken seriously by all parties involved in a commercial sale or lease. A thorough review of the new sections is recommended in order to fully appreciate the many details in the Acts.
